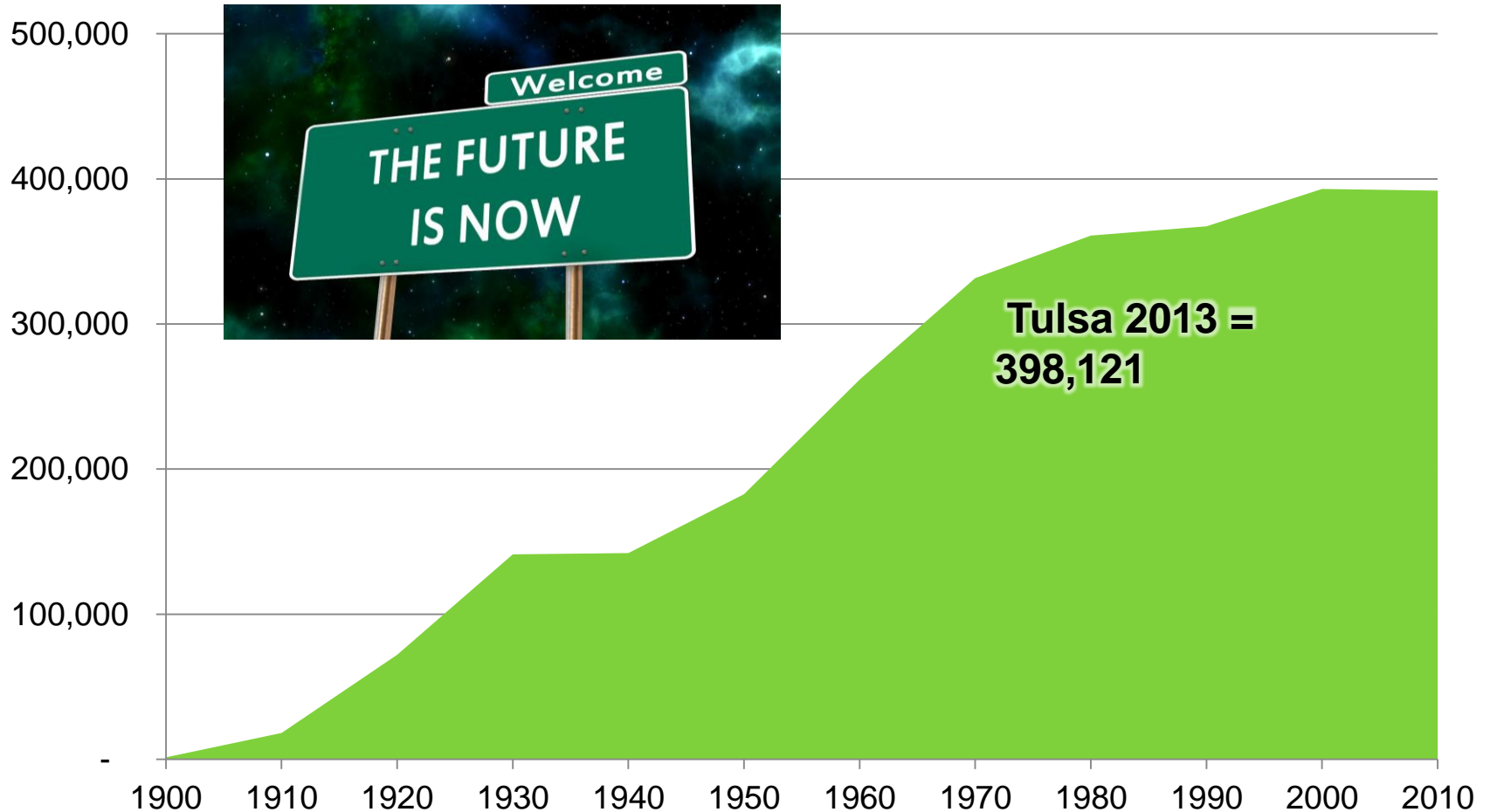

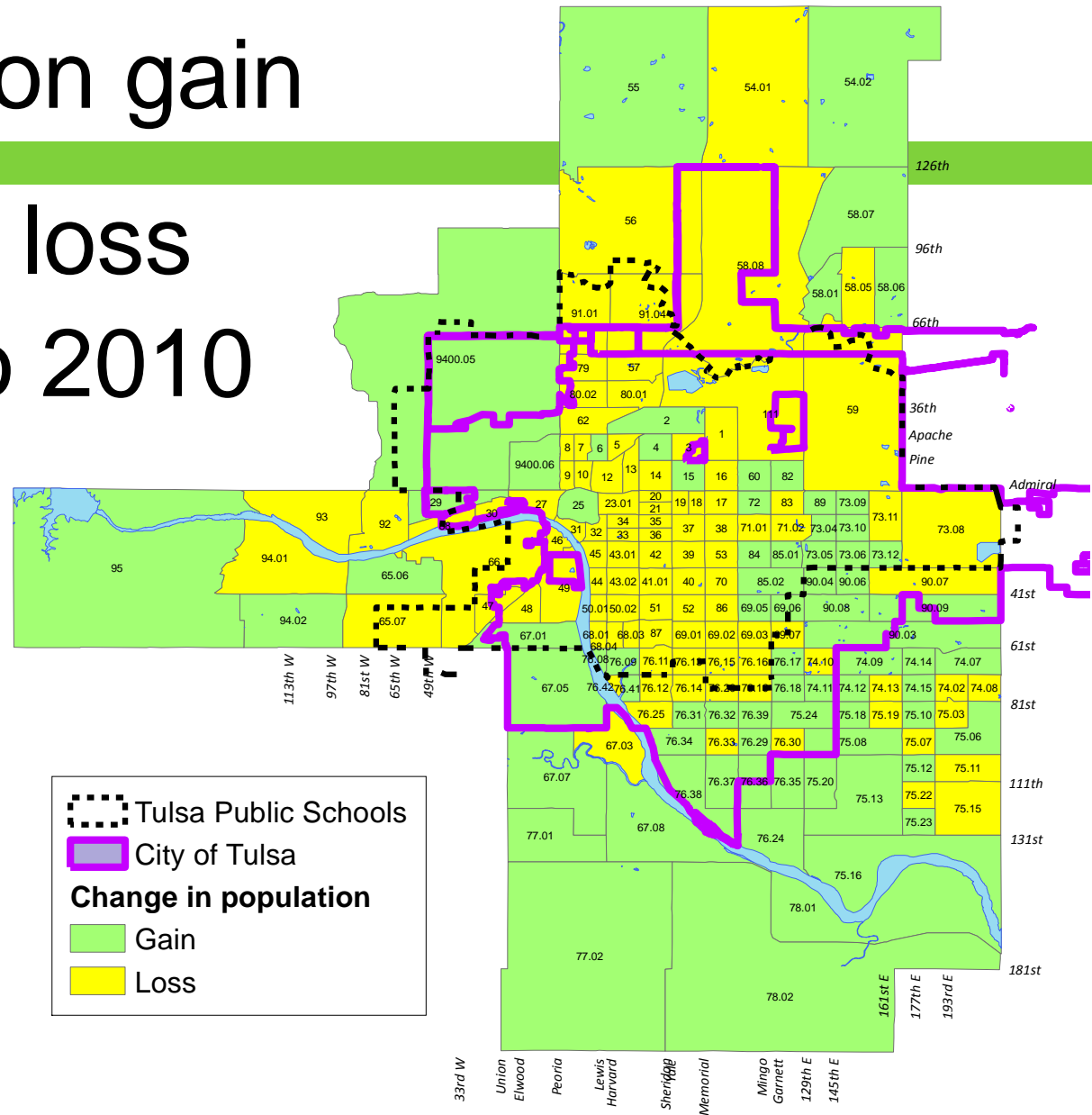

## ...and loss 2000 to 2010

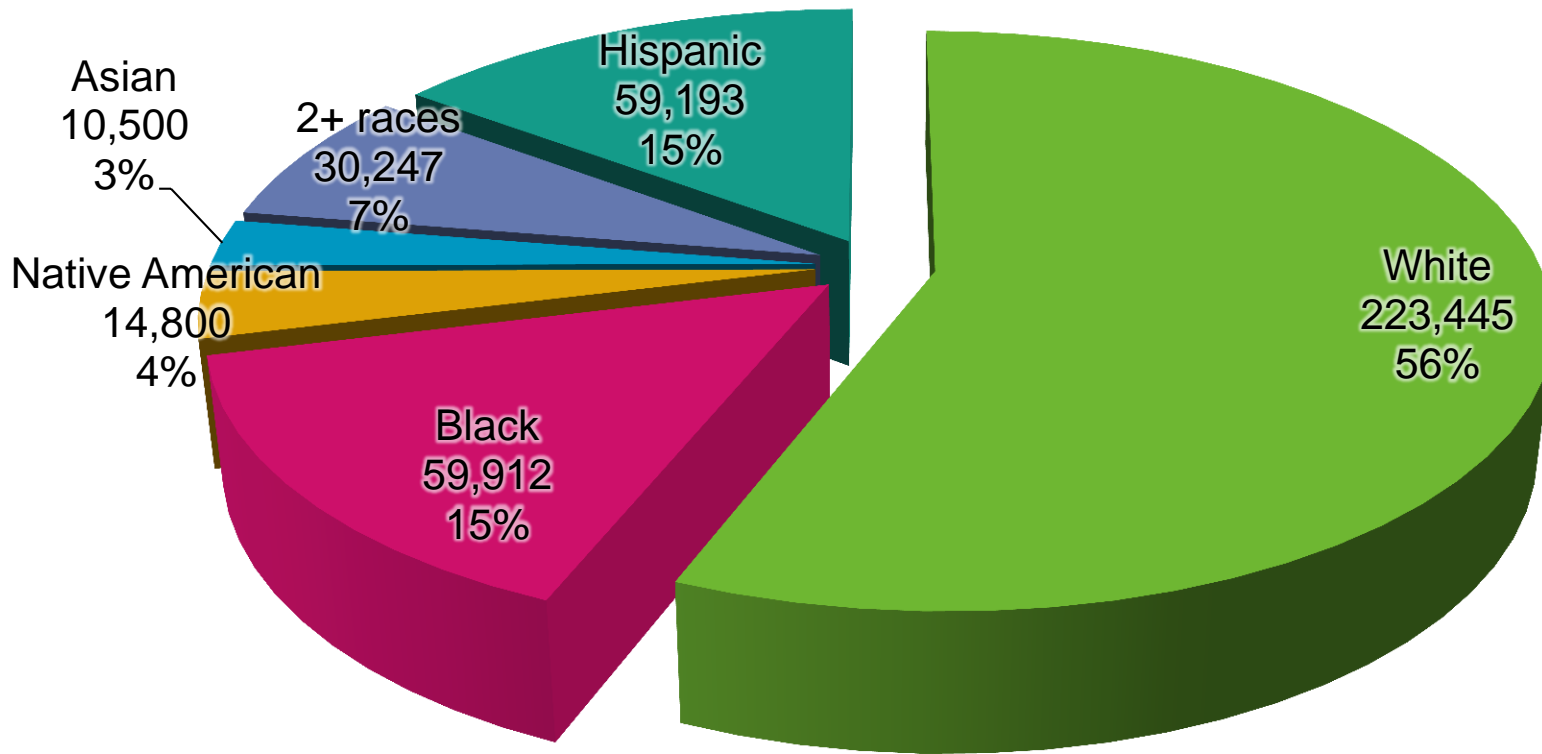

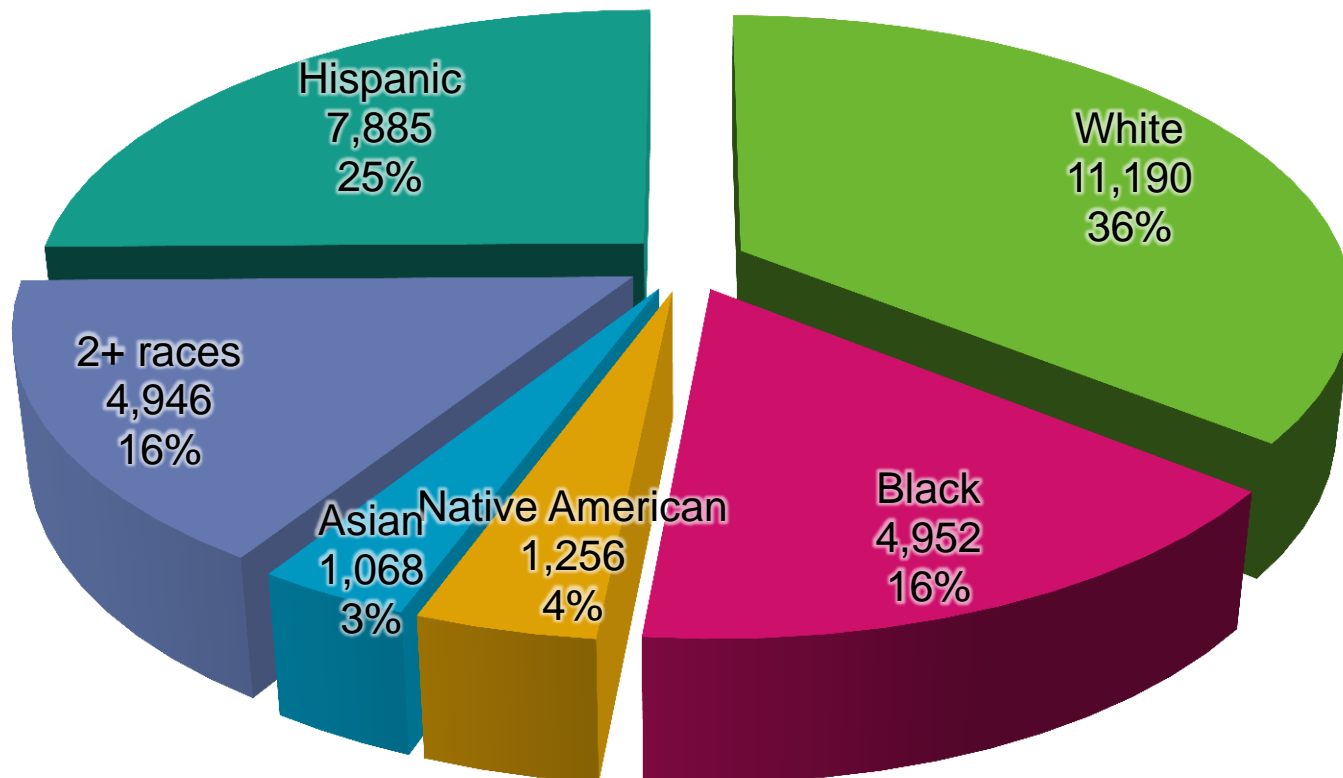

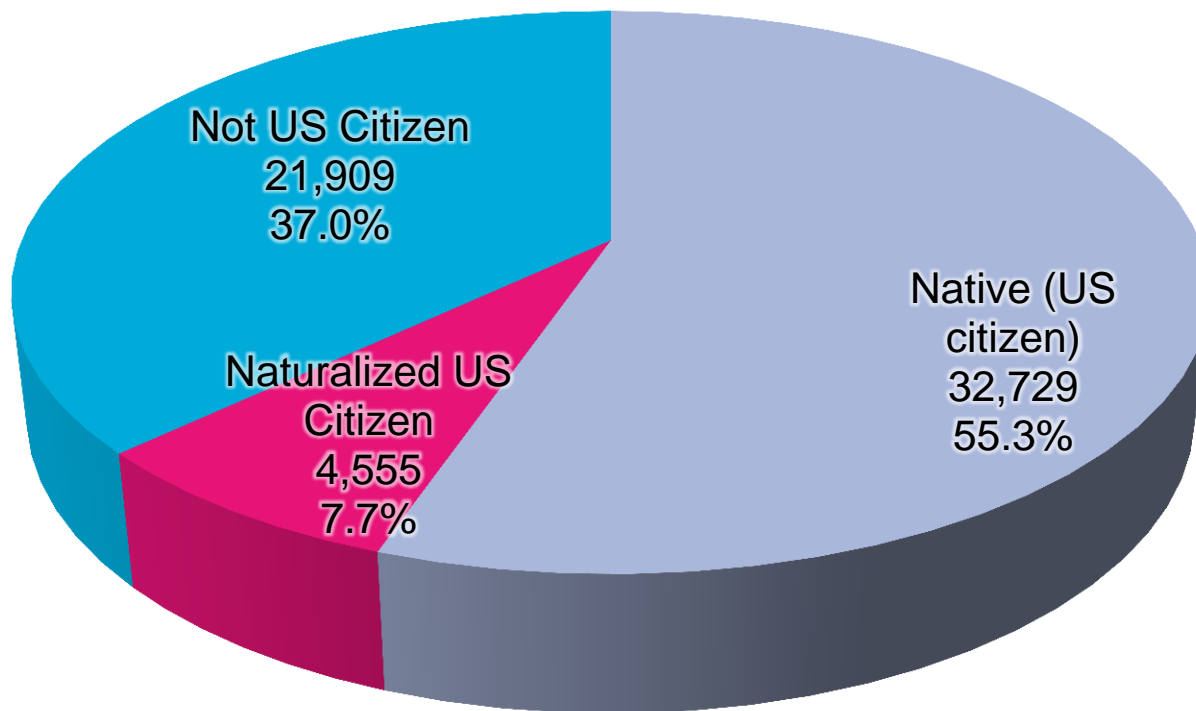

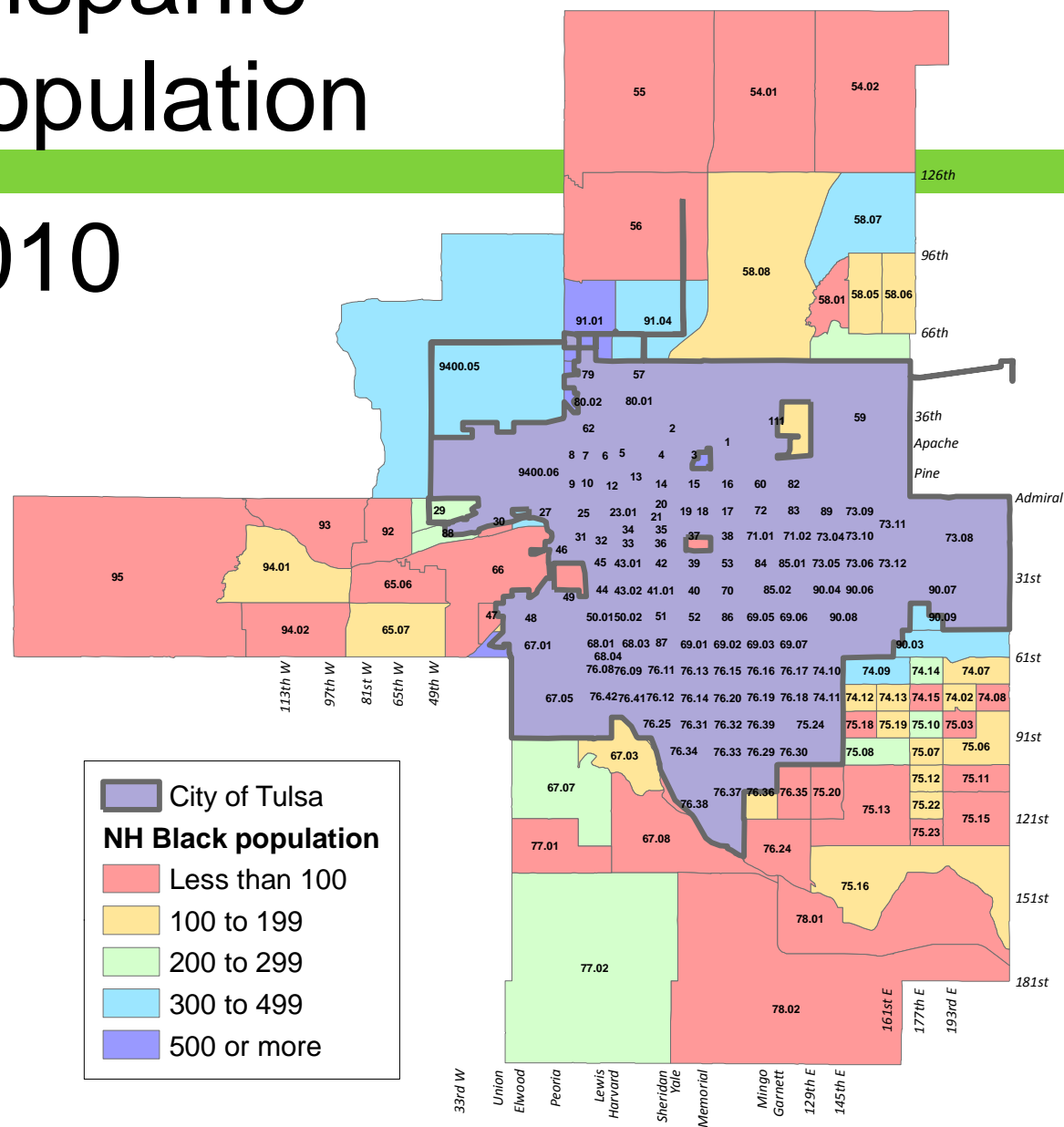

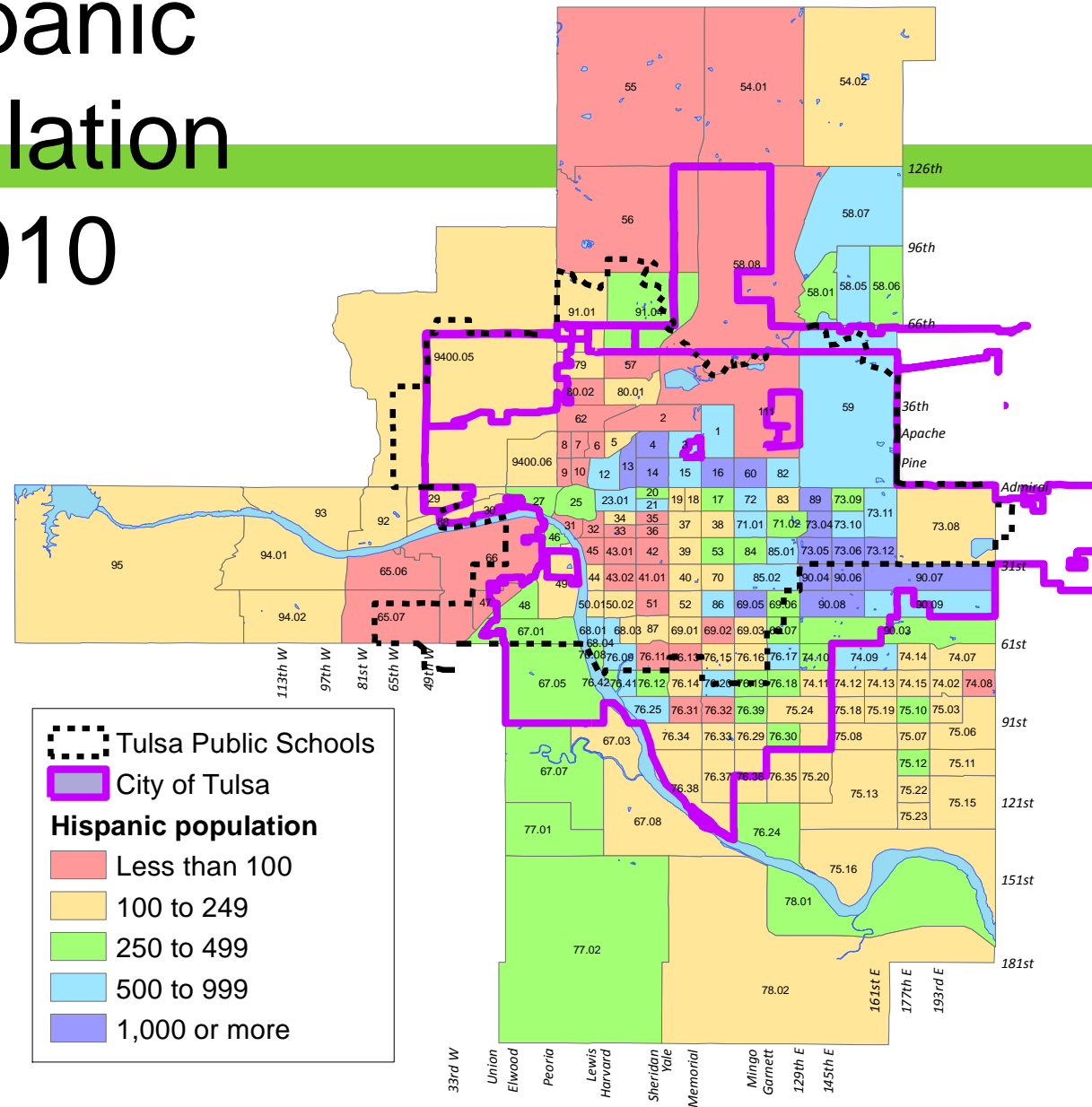

## Religious Affiliation in America by Age, 2013

- 20% of all Americans are religiously unaffiliated
- 25% of the unaffiliated are self-described atheist or agnostic
- 30% of the population under age 30 years self-report unaffiliated
- The U.S. is the most religiously affiliated developed country in the world
- The U.S. is shifting from a majority protestant nation with just 51% affiliating as a protestant

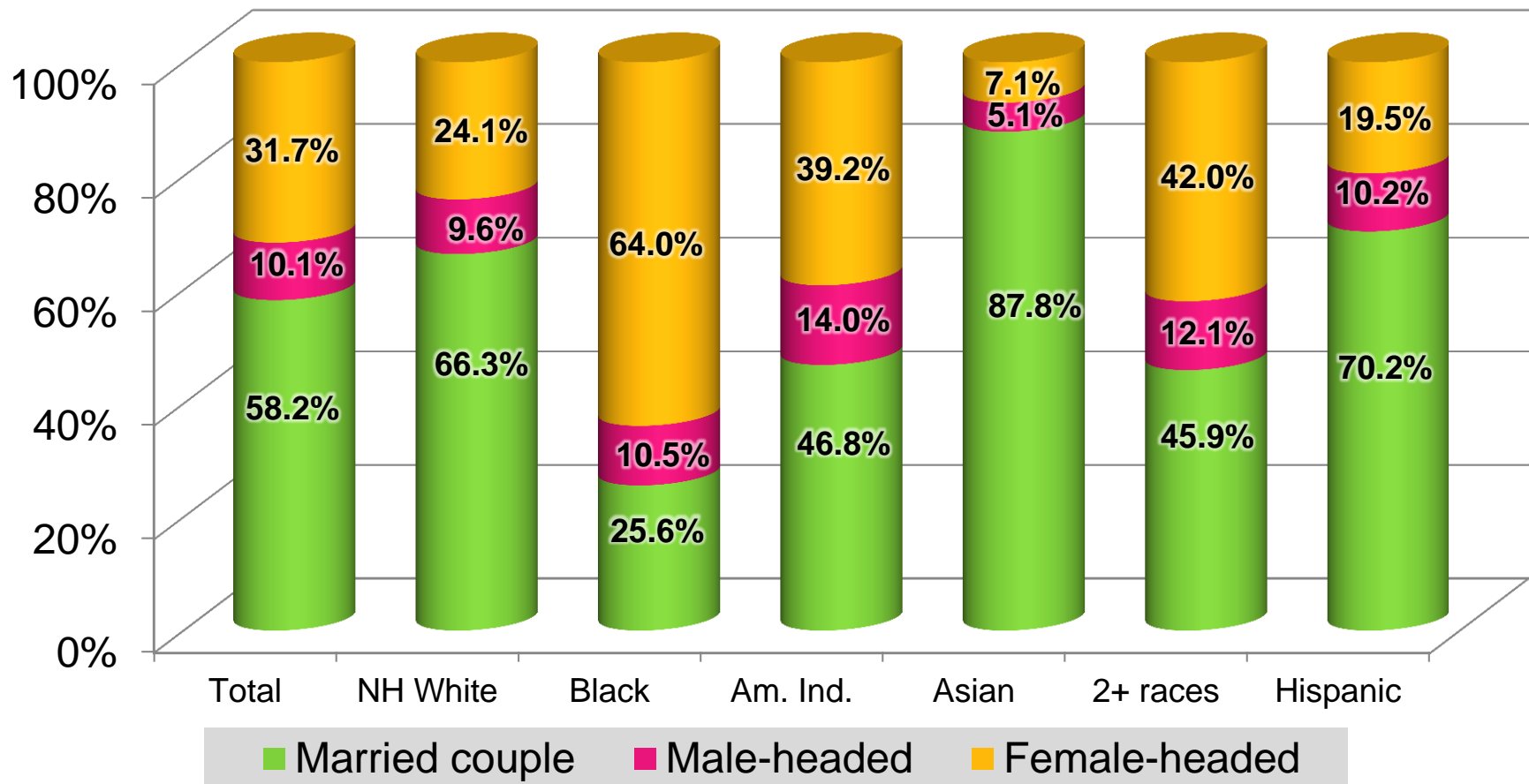

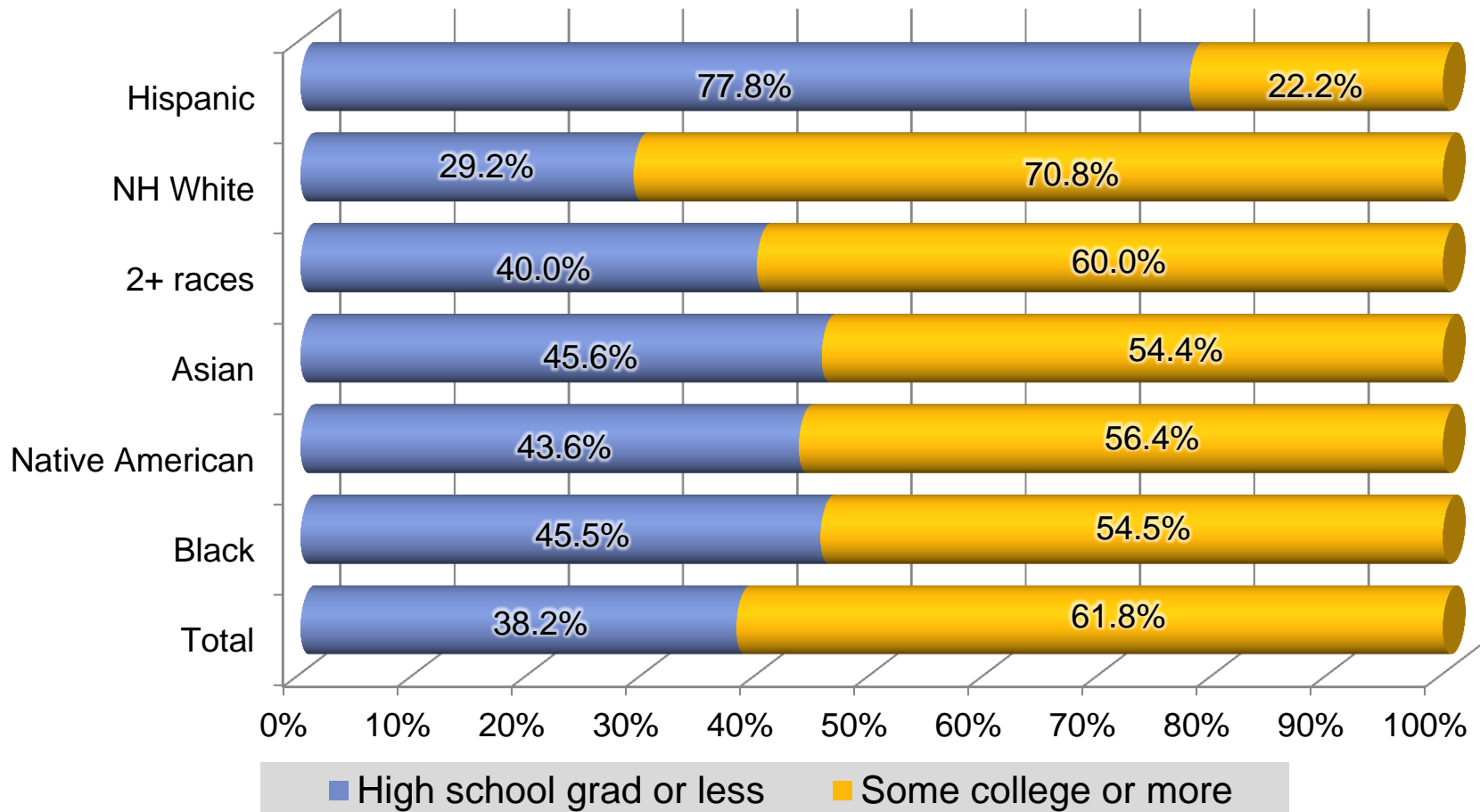

## Tulsa adults age 25+, 2013

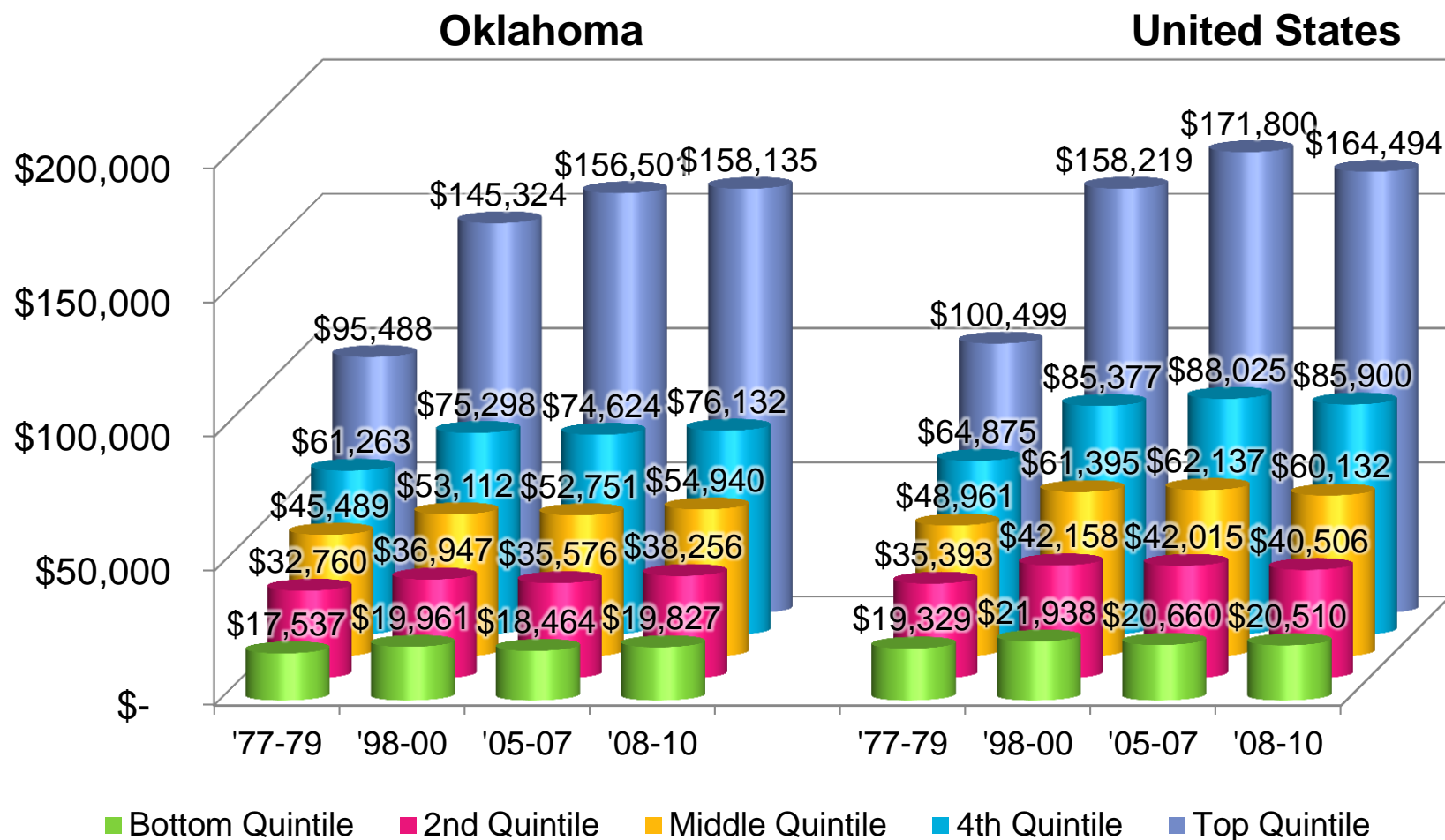

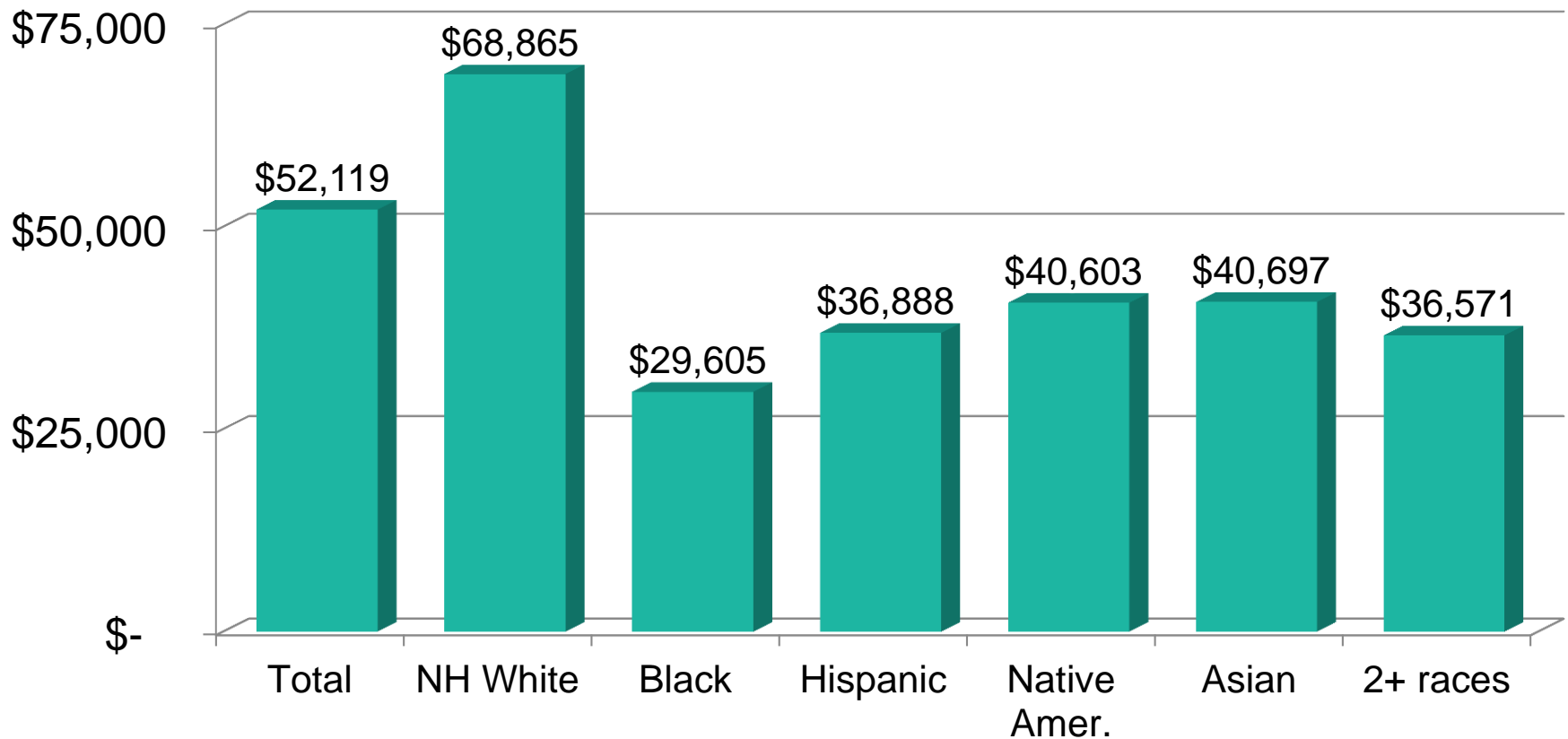

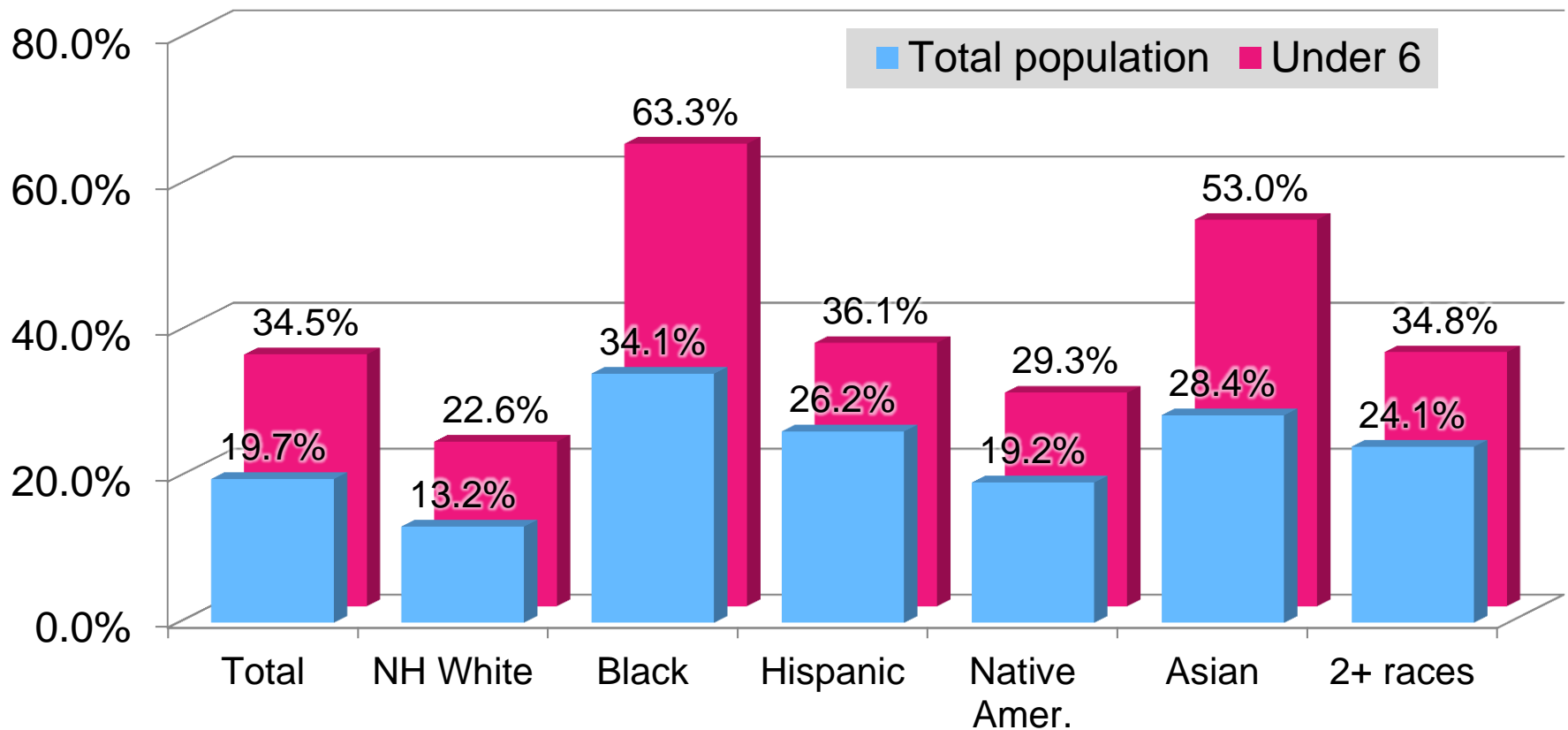
