

NANCY M^CDONALD

For over 45 years, Nancy has served students, families and educators within the Tulsa Public Schools district. She worked as the Volunteer Coordinator for TPS, as well as the Director of Business Community Resources and Adopt a School initiatives for the district. Nancy was instrumental in the integration of Tulsa Public Schools. She was an active member of the League of Women Voters Task Force on Integration and chaired the committee to desegregate Booker T. Washington High School. Tulsa Public Schools then employed her as Director of Magnet School Recruitment and Placement.

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Nancy volunteered for the Girl Scouts' Magic Empire Council for over 15 years, and led the Council as President of the Board for five years. She founded the Tulsa chapter of PFLAG and served on the National Board of Directors. Other organizations that benefitted from Nancy's involvement include the Tulsa Boys' Home, the YMCA, the Community Service Council, Tulsa Community College Foundation, Tulsa CARES, Gay and Lesbian Fund of Tulsa, and the Oklahoma Center for Community and Justice where she was the driving force behind the Different and the Same program and other school-based programs. She has testified in Congress and helped pass legislation in Oklahoma to prevent discrimination and protect Oklahoma students against bullying.

Since January 2012, Dennis has served as a Senior Program Officer for the Charles and Lynn Schusterman Family Foundation, with a focus on the Foundation's educational and Tulsa-based investments. He has also been a board member and/or officer with several other non-profits, including Youth Services of Tulsa, ACLU of OK, Oklahomans for Equality (co-founder and first president), Tulsa Human Rights Commission, and the Tulsa Economic Development Corporation.

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
